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Vision

A family for every child

This year, AFABC worked hard to keep ahead of the changing needs of adoptive families.

More families were able to access adoption support and education thanks to our expanding online programs. Our online support groups allowed families who live in remote areas of BC to connect with each other. The accessibility and convenience of our AEP-Online program lead to an increase in demand of 223%, showing us that online learning is definitely participant-friendly.

To increase awareness of the 1,000 kids and youth in government care we partnered with the Ministry of Children and Family Development on the 1000 Families BC campaign. We also developed a PSA commercial featuring Vancouver Whitecaps FC players Kekuta Manneh and Christian Dean, who are both adopted.

With over half of the children and youth in government care having Aboriginal heritage, the importance of maintaining relational, cultural, and physical connections for these kids has never been more of a priority. Our new Pathways program trains social

Many of our education programs received updates to bring more Aboriginal perspectives to our training, and we continue to make partnerships with the Aboriginal community to ensure the best future for kids in care.

Nineteen-year-old Lindsey Lillian from Nanaimo is pursuing esthetics at Vancouver Island University, and Dominik Zembrowski, 22, from Vancouver is in his second year in BCIT's mechatronics and robotics program. These two former youth in care were the recipients of the first ever **Howard Legacy Youth Fund** awards. This bursary provides financial assistance to youth in and from care who are hoping to attend trade, vocational, or academic post secondary programs.

The adoption community has many champions who strive to better the lives of waiting kids and adoptive families through organizational change, media awareness, volunteerism, and philanthropy. This year's **AFABC**

Adoption Awards recognized Pieta Woolley and the Tyee for their media series on the complex challenges youth in care face when they turn 19. Also recognized were longtime volunteer Deanna Jones; adoption champion Drew Savage; adoption employee benefits provider Deloitte Canada; longtime donor the John Hardie Mitchell Family Foundation; and Howard Legacy Youth Fund creator Peggy Howard.

Our volunteers gifted over 1,400 hours of their time to help out at family social events and camps, to share their stories in our magazine, and to provide support for other parents.

Families in Nanaimo, Kamloops, Vernon, and Nelson now have access to **PASS**—our innovative hands-on parenting training—with the expansion of the program to these areas of the province.

Families that live in remote areas and those who can't access our face-to-face services are now able to access more support thanks to an increase in our **online support services** with Facebook groups, including two new groups: Waiting Parents and Adoptive Parents of Teens.

As valuable as online flexibility is, equally important for families and parents is having "face time" with support coordinators and peers. GLBTQ parents,

families with children of African heritage, parents in Vernon, waiting parents, and families with children with FASD are meeting each other and us regularly at coffee shops and community centres.

Children, youth, and parents build the best connections with each other during playtime. This past year, we saw hundreds of families playing, picnicking, swimming, skating, and camping their way into each other's lives and hearts at over 30 family social events all across the province.

For prospective adoptive parents like Tim and Amber Neufeld, the MCFD-required Adoption Education Program (AEP) used to mean re-arranged work and personal schedules to accommodate classroom time. Thanks to our **AEP-Online** program, they can now complete assignments at their convenience and from the comfort of their own home. This flexibility resulted in a 223% increase in demand for the program.

Fifty percent of children and youth in government care have an Aboriginal background, and the AEP-Online now brings more Aboriginal perspectives to its content so that parents have a strong foundation of knowledge of the cultural

community of their children.

Over 60 people across BC tuned in to Cultural Planning in BC, a new webinar focused on the importance of cultural planning for Aboriginal children in care. Free **webinars** like this one bring groundbreaking content to families who might not otherwise be able to access this information in their community.

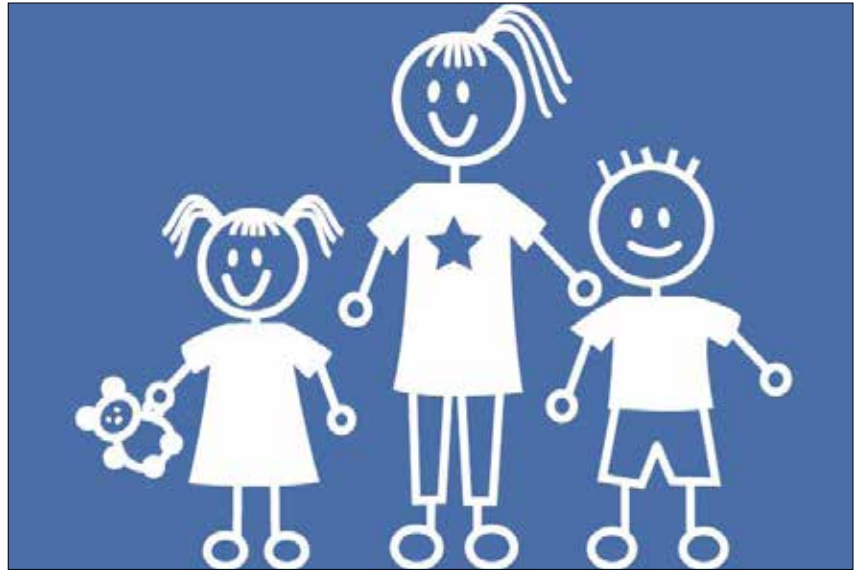

With more than half of our kids in care having Aboriginal heritage, our community partners have emphasized the importance of maintaining cultural connections.

We worked to bring more **Aboriginal perspectives** to many of our programs. Our new Pathways program trains social workers in family finding techniques that strengthen children's connections to birth culture(s) and communities.

We walked with our GLBTQ families in the Vancouver Pride Parade in August, and supported unrestricted use of bursary funding for former youth in care in October.

Our participation on the Safe Babies Committee allows us to hear from and **advocate for families** parenting children with prenatal exposure.

Media issues, such as the Fifth Estate's coverage of "rehoming" and CKNW's investigation of privacy restrictions around child profiles, keeps AFABC in the news and on our toes about the need to remain respectful of our families' privacy while at the same time supporting opportunities to **influence systemic change** in adoption-related concerns.

BC's Lieutenant Governor, Judith Guichon, shared her story of adoption, faith, and perseverance during **Adoption Awareness Month** in the hopes of motivating more families to offer their home to a child or youth in care.

AFABC, the Lieutenant Governor, the Minister of Children and Family Development, and BC's Representative for Children and Youth joined together to create **1000 Families BC**. This campaign reflected the need to find 1000 families for the 1000 children and youth in care, aimed to dispel common myths of adoption, and promoted unique and

diverse adoptive families.

Vancouver Whitecaps FC players Kekuta Manneh and Christian Dean shared their adoption stories and helped us make a **public service announcement** for Adoption Awareness Month.

Families celebrated Adoption Awareness Month with us at our fabulous annual Family Fun Day in Burnaby, a Christmas parade float in Duncan, a games night, a family portrait session, and family skates throughout the province.

Former youth in care worked on an exciting new web project that launches in June 2015. **AgedOut.com** will be an up-to-date warehouse of information on services available to young people, in addition to being a learning tool to help youth feel empowered as they leave care. Youth participated in focus groups, content, videos, and planning for the site. AgedOut.com will be the most comprehensive online tool for helping youth in and from care navigate the complexities of adulthood.

The **Speak-Out Youth Group (SYG)** shared their powerful voices

with community partners including the Ministry of Children and Family Development, the Federation of BC Youth in Care Networks, Aunt Leah's, and more. The group was also a partner in planning the BC Child and Youth in Care week celebrations.

The group learned skills in print and web publishing as they created the third **Speak-Out Youth newsletter** and launched a blog on the **Speak-Out Youth Zone** website.

More of BC's most vulnerable waiting children found permanent family connections thanks to our expanded team of **Child Specific Recruiters (CSRs)** and our **Wendy's Wonderful Kids (WWK)** recruiters.

Autumn has connected with her family, community and culture with the help of Kelly Davie, AFABC's CSR in Nanaimo. Kids like Autumn now have the help of three new CSRs in Vancouver Island and the Interior region. CSRs have smaller caseloads, which allows them to develop individualized permanency plans for each child based on the child's unique

background and needs.

Kids who work with CSRs and who are over the age of 15, as well as those with mental health disorders, are three times more likely to find permanency than youth who are served by another form of adoption preparation and recruitment.

BC's delegated Aboriginal agencies and MCFD trained in the specialized family finding that our CSRs use. The **Pathways program's** Creating Connections workshop was delivered in 10 communities, with new workshops being developed for 2015.

The Lex Reynolds Adoption & Permanency Trust Fund honours the late lawyer, children's advocate – and adoptive father – who was the fund's founding co-chair.



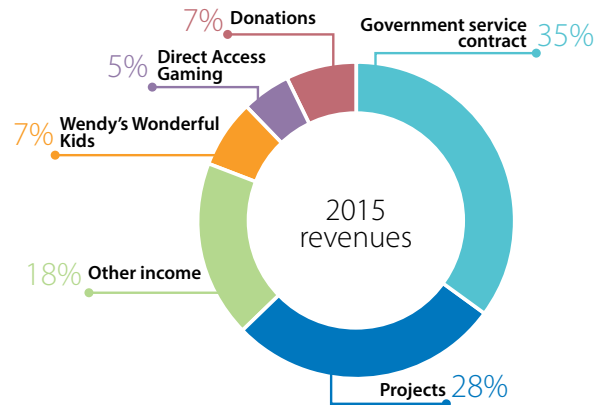
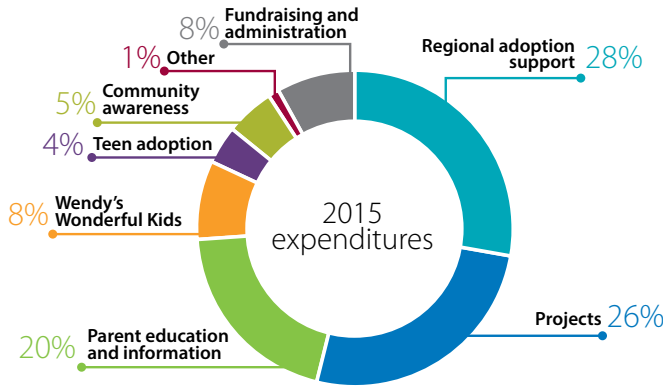

Highlights from the Treasurer

Fiscal 2015 was another strong year of steady growth and expansion. We are very excited about the areas with the most significant growth: the AEP-Online, the PASS program, and AgedOut.com. These account for a 15% increase (\$249K) in total expenditures and are partially supported by one-time-only government grants. Government service contracts and grants continued to account for over 60% of our revenues, while donations represented 7% (8% in fiscal 2014). To help support the above

programs, we will continue to diversify our revenue sources by investing in fundraising programs that will grow our donor base. We are proud to say that about 90% of our revenues were invested in programs, services, and projects that benefitted children and youth in need of a forever family.

During the year, a surplus of \$73K was earned. The Board restricted \$50K of it into our operating reserve for future contingencies in response to the

increase in our expenditure level. In addition, \$5,000 was reserved to fund summer camps for adopted children. Finally, AFABC allocated \$4,160 to match generous donations from Peggy Howard and friends towards our youth bursaries.
